Picton -- The County Workforce Partnership will mark the first-ever Work Local Week from March 7-11, with workshops, networking events and the inaugural "County Career Crawl," a non-traditional job fair to help connect employers with job-seekers and resources to help attract, train and retain new employees.

"COVID-19 has radically changed the labour market," says Lesley Lavender, Executive Director of the Prince Edward County Chamber of Commerce. "We are here to support our businesspeople through relevant programs that will act to strengthen our economy and build a sustainable community."
